

For the last year my twenty-something daughter and her friends have been anticipating a night at Sofi Stadium a couple of weeks ago. That night was the Taylor Swift concert. They spent time figuring out what they were going to wear, makeup to put on, and even made friendship bracelets to trade with other concert goers. Can you imagine a person that can sell out a 70,000 seat stadium six times, and have thousands of fans wanting to be so close even when they did not have tickets sit outside? This is not even getting into the atmosphere and community that was inside. All to be a part of a musical performance? I am sure that each of us has their own band, musical, performance, sporting event, etc. that we would want to participate in and give such devotion to.

What makes wanting to be a part of a concert so special and memorable? Each person regardless of wealth, socioeconomics, race, political affiliation, and other core beliefs blended into this mass of concertgoers. For those moments together it did not matter. Each longed to be a participant in this experience and when they left.... they still shared that common experience. In many ways, I long and pray that the church can emulate what happened that night. We run in a fast paced life where we often do not have the opportunity to sit and reflect on what is happening in our life. I invite you to join us in a time of Sabbath and reflection. Rev.
